My husband, Fred, has accepted a new call as pastor of 'Church in the Gardens' (UCC) in Forest Hill, Queens, New York. I am currently also pursuing a call in a congregation in the Metropolitan New York Synod. This means we will be moving to the 'Big Apple'! Though I am sad to leave the San Francisco Area and St. Matthew's, at the same time I am also excited about what God has in store for us.



My last official day as pastor of St. Matthew's will be December 31st. I will celebrate my last worship service together with you on Sunday, December 26th (2nd Day of Christmas). at 11 a.m. There will be a farewell reception after the service. I hope you can come!

The Sierra Pacific Synod office is aware of the situation and will work with the St. Matthew's leadership to take appropriate steps as this congregation will be looking for a new pastor.

It has been an honor and a blessing for me to serve among you, and to serve with you over the last seven and a half years. Thank you for all your prayers, your love, and your support. I will always remember the amazing 'cloud of witnesses' I have encountered at St. Matthew's. May God continue to be with you, as God has been present in this community of faith over the last 126 years.

#### **Spiritual Reflection** by Pr. Kerstin Weidmann

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. 1st Thessalonians 5: 16-18

November is an interesting month in the cycle of the church year. We start counting the last Sundays of our church year as 'Sundays of End Time'. In North American Lutheran tradition, the first Sunday in November is observed as All Saints Day – a day to remember those who passed away during the course of the last year. German Lutherans don't observe All Saints Day, but instead remember those who passed away on the last Sunday before Advent on what is called 'Sunday of the Dead' or 'Eternity Sunday'.\* November is a month to



reflect on our mortality – and on the reality that all things at some point come to an end.

Here in the U.S., we also celebrate the day of Thanksgiving during the month of November - and this year, there are plenty of reasons to be thankful now that the pandemic seems to be slowing down and we are able to more or less gather with family and friends 'as usual' for this holiday. But then, in general, there are many things we can be thankful for: people we love, the roof over our head, the abundance of food and goods, among many other things.

It is easy to be thankful and give thanks when life is good. It is much harder to feel thankful when there is want, pain, loss, or grief. And so at first, it may seem counterintuitive to celebrate Thanksgiving during a month when we as followers of Christ also focus on death and the end of things. However, the Apostle Paul encourages and even admonishes us to 'give thanks in *all* circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.' Thankfulness changes our focus and makes us look at what we have rather than what we lack (or think we lack).

As we mourn our dead, we should remember what they were to us – and give thanks that they walked with us for a while during our time here on earth. As we grieve the end of things, we should be thankful for all the good we have experienced – and also give thanks for new things to come.

I am aware that there are those among you who are sad and disappointed that I am leaving St. Matthew's at the end of the year. Seven and a half years of joint ministry will come to an end. Seven and a half years of sharing joy and sorrow and life stories. Seven and a half years of celebrations and challenges. It's hard for me to leave all this behind. But in all my grief, I feel deep thankfulness for you and what you shared with me during those last years. I feel truly blessed to have been your pastor.

My hope for you is that, as you go into uncertain times, you will be able to embrace the new possibilities God has in store for you as the people of St. Matthew's – and beyond. My hope and prayer for you is that you feel surrounded by God in all circumstances – and never cease to rejoice, to pray, and to give thanks in all circumstances.

\*At St. Matthew's this year, we will remember the dead on November  $14^{th}$  during our online worship service, and on November  $21^{st}$  as we gather in person.


# **Special Upcoming Worship Services**


